Notes:

1. In front of the high hedge along the entire frontage of the Fishing Lakes, from the Crest Hill junction to the County Boundary, there are, on the broad verge, a significant number of trees, all about 12ft high, carefully spaced, but not recorded in the original listings

2a. On the left hand side of Norton Road, from the Anchor Lane turning, in the area thus formed between Norton Road and Anchor Lane there is, behind the broad verge and hedge line a mature mixed woodland set in the hollow. A well-used footpath, via steps, traverses this area, joining the two roads.

2b. On the opposite side of the road, from just before the Anchor Lane turn-off, up to the footpath exit from Cherry Orchard, there is a broad verge, with a high hedge-line and a substantial bank behind, which has a number of mature mixed trees present. The mature Sequoladendron Wellingtonia are of special significance, and (if not already) should be listed and protected.
